

# Come Culture-Caching in Carson Valley, Nevada: Summer's New Must-Try Activity

Navigate the region by unearthing its copious cultural gems

**CARSON VALLEY, Nev. (May 23, 2024)** — Geocaching, a popular way to explore new places in search of buried artifacts, is nothing new. Now, there's a new kind of caching happening in Carson Valley, Nevada. But this time, there's no need for shovels and picks to dig through dirt; instead, navigate to hot spots around this unique northern Nevada destination to uncover its abundant cultural treasures. Locals call it "culture-caching," and below, Carson Valley has your itemized map.

It's time to don that exploration gear and set sites on Carson Valley's rich culture. The locale's location, nestled at the foot of the Sierra Nevada, and its wildest of Wild West traditions make it the perfect destination for discovery. Below are some conceptual coordinates to input into that travel GPS.

# 1. Destination: History

When it comes to cultural treasure maps, "X" marks the spot — or should it be "M" for museums? The first culture-caching stop might just be the <u>Carson Valley Museum and Cultural Center</u>. Even the building is historic, with its architecture by the famous Frederic J. DeLongchamps landing it on the National Register of Historic Places.

Inside, be sure to check out "Main Street," a life-size depiction of Main Street in Gardnerville as it was from 1870-1950, with its mercantile, drug stores, doctor's office, barbershop, and newspaper office.

Next up, the <u>Courthouse Museum in Genoa</u> — which originally operated as the Douglas County Courthouse from 1865 to 1916 and later served as the Genoa School. Don't miss the Snowshoe Thompson exhibit representing the history of John A. "Snowshoe" Thompson, who earned his nickname by using skis to cross the treacherous Sierra Nevada as he delivered mail from Genoa to Placerville, California.

## 2. Shop for Buried Treasure in Plain Sight

For those more excited by the prospect of literally digging for historic treasures — Carson Valley has its own dedicated map guiding visitors to these locales, too. Antique hunting is practically a contact sport in Carson Valley, so much so that the Carson Valley Arts Council created its own Arts & Antiques Trail treasure map highlighting locations to find that old-fashioned ranch item (tip: That's likely found at Red Barn Antiques) or other relics of historical significance (like what can be found at Gardnerville's Cheshire Antiques or the Home in Genoa, among others).

Add this to the treasure map: <u>Antiques Plus/The Dake House</u>, where collectibles and antique furniture are found in a structure oozing historic charm. The building was constructed in the 1870s and shared the property with farm buildings, an undertaking parlor, and the justice of the peace office.

#### 3. Ranch Out into Unknown Territories

Cason Valley has rich ranching roots, and its many working ranches are ripe for exploration, hosting events, celebrations, and even tours.

June's <u>BackCountry Festival</u> happens at the Corley Ranch May 31 through June 2, where attendees can lounge on a grassy pasture of a working ranch enjoying barbeque, beer, and country artists on stage against a picturesque Sierra Nevada backdrop. Or visit Minden's <u>Park Home Ranch</u>, a 120-year-old barn wedding venue also boasting sweeping views of the Sierra Nevada.

Carson Valley offers historic properties converted into opportunities for cultural discovery, like the <u>Dangberg Home Ranch Historic Park</u>. This county-owned public park features historic buildings with interpretive signs that share the site's <u>history</u>. Heinrich Friedrich Dangberg and four generations of Dangbergs lived here, and at one point, they had 50,000 acres for their expansive cattle ranching operation. Take a guided tour of the Dangberg Home Ranch, visiting the property's stone cellar (built in 1870) and laundry house (constructed around the turn of the century).

## 4. Step Back in Time

Interested in following in the footsteps of original Carson Valley settlers? Find a few points of interest below to add to the destinations and experiences already highlighted, but to truly experience the past, savvy culture cachers can plan a trip to the region during <a href="Carson Valley Days">Carson Valley Days</a>. The region has celebrated its Smalltown USA character for 114 years and counting with a hometown parade, horseshoe tournament, exhibits, and more.

Another must-visit: Mormon Station State Historic Park, a portion of which was originally built as a trading post during the 1849 Gold Rush. California-bound travelers stopped here to rest and purchase supplies before tackling the trip over the punishing Sierra Nevada, making this the first permanent non-native settlement in Nevada — which later became known as Genoa. Don't miss the historic stockade and wagon shed, which is free. Admission to the museum is \$1 for adults and free for children 12 and younger.

Thirsty adventurers can quench their thirst at the <u>Genoa Bar and Saloon</u> built in 1853, making it the oldest bar in Nevada with a rich history punctuated by the occasional visit from a fabulously famous face. Do names like Mark Twain, Clint Eastwood, John Wayne, and Ulysses S. Grant sound familiar? They've all been there, done that! While sitting at the original wooden bar, don't miss a chance to peruse the location's vintage oil paintings and photographs from early pioneer days, and be sure to search for an authentic "wanted" poster from 1865 offering a reward for capturing President Abraham Lincoln's assassin.

## 5. Walk on the Wild (Animal) Side

The region is a pocket of Northern Nevada where nature, landscapes, and wild characters harmonize throughout the region's four communities of Genoa, Gardnerville, Minden, and Topaz Lake.

Find animal culture icons like wild mustangs grazing in herds and dotting the hillsides, while raptors and other migratory birds stalk their rodent prey from above. Many visitors come to <u>capture their</u> <u>own images of native wildlife</u> while navigating the glorious landscape. The region's <u>extensive trails</u> <u>system</u> allows photographers to enter nature and capture the valley's beauty.

**Heads up**: To truly witness the wild side, schedule a personalized or group <u>tour with wildlife guides</u> from a variety of specialties.

Put these coordinates into your GPS to start planning the adventure: 38.94388, -119.75169 Through its blend of exploration and cultural discovery, culture-caching creates a unique and enriching way for visitors to connect with their surroundings and appreciate the richness of Carson Valley's cultural heritage. From legendary forefathers who paved the way to Nevada statehood, to wild horse bands, eagles, and other wildlife, to premiere air sports, American Indian, Basque, and Western Ranching histories and cultures, and distinctive dining experiences that all exist here and only here, Carson Valley offers an adventure for everyone.
