Carson Valley, Nevada, Serves as an affordable and accommodating ski trip basecamp

CARSON VALLEY, Nev. (Oct. 16, 2024) – A recent Expedia Trends in Travel report cites a rise in destination dupes — applying the TikTok "dupe" trend that typically touts affordable cosmetic alternatives to standard favorites – to the travel industry. These increasingly popular vacation dupes, the report says, are "just as trip-worthy as their tried-and-true doppelgängers" — but often offer something a little different or unexpected.

With this idea in mind, winter travelers can plan their next vacation to a destination offering unparalleled proximity to Lake Tahoe and all its winter alpine glory, but with less snow to shovel in the mornings, more affordable lodging, and access to a multitude of winter activities in all directions. The destination? Carson Valley, Nevada.

Sitting at only 4,700 feet in elevation and in the protective shadow of the Sierra Nevada to the west and the Pine Nut Mountains to the east, Carson Valley is comprised of the quaint communities of Genoa, Gardnerville, Minden, and Topaz Lake, all boasting locations close to

Lake Tahoe's winter action while providing miles of secluded space and an opportunity to unplug and tap into Old West ambiance.

Skiing is Believing

Carson Valley is only 12 miles east of South Lake Tahoe ski resorts and 15 minutes from miles of wide-open backcountry to the south and west. Lake Tahoe is home to 14 ski resorts, meaning a stay in Carson Valley brings world-class downhill and cross-country skiing, snowboarding, backcountry touring, and snowshoeing to every visitor's doorstep.

Carson Valley's nearest ski resort is <u>Heavenly Lake Tahoe</u>, which spans the Nevada-California border. Just a 25-minute ride brings drivers to an appropriately celestial destination renowned for Lake Tahoe views and its all-level varied terrain. Or travel a bit farther south to <u>Kirkwood</u>, which receives an average of almost 400 inches of snow per year. Kirkwood is known for the quality of its snow and terrain variety and offers downhill and cross-country skiing, snowboarding, snowshoeing, and sled dog tours.

Snow Play All Day

For those along for the ride but not into skiing and boarding, there's a snow-play experience waiting in Hope Valley, just 30 minutes to the southwest. Hope Valley is known for cross-country skiing, backcountry skiing, snowshoeing, rentals, lessons, and guided tours. Or for even easier snow fun, families can head to the intersection of SR-88 and SR-89, known as <u>Picketts Junction</u>. A short hike from the parking lot will introduce winter wonder-seekers to a magical sledding and tubing hill.

View Winter Through a Different Lens

One of the many reasons winter travelers flock to Lake Tahoe is for the jaw-dropping scenery, and while Carson Valley visitors will surely take in the majesty of the "Jewel of the Sierra" during their journey, they'll also want to catch sight of Carson Valley's abundant wild mammals and birds of prey through a photographic lens. The area is famous for frequent wildlife sightings of native large animals such as wild horses, mountain lions, lynx, and mule deer, as well as raptors, waterfowl, turtles, lynx, and more. Carson Valley's diverse ecosystems, including grassland, wetland, chaparral, montane and alpine, support an array of ecological communities, and winter is prime viewing season.

Basecamp without Breaking the Bank

<u>Carson Valley accommodations</u> are ideal for winter travelers seeking a basecamp that is both affordable and less likely to find them digging snow tunnels to reach their car. Both the <u>Carson Valley Inn</u> and the <u>Holiday Inn Express and Suites Minden</u> boast relaxing hot tubs and refreshing room rates. Or guests to the region can cozy up by the fireplace and soak in the views from a

natural hot spring — part of <u>Holiday Inn Club Vacations David Walley's Resort</u>. For an authentic step back in time, history buffs can visit modern versions of yesteryear at <u>Genoa's White House</u> <u>Inn or Gardnerville's Historian Inn</u>.

Destination dupes are in hot demand, so cold-weather travelers should keep in mind: Carson Valley is known for offering effortless access to world-famous Lake Tahoe — without the need to shovel all that glorious snow!
